
Brock's Ancestors

In our narratives we have been working on our sizzling starts and our exciting endings. Once we have finished them off, we have turned them into colourful picture books!



In G6 we have been crazy about maths. We have been learning everything from capacity to time. We were measuring containers in our sinks at home all the way to making potions in the wizard kitchen. PAT testing

Students in years 3 to 10 annually undertake the online Progressive Achievement Tests in Reading Comprehension (PAT-R) and Mathematics (PAT-M) during weeks 7 to 10 of term 3. The PAT results support teachers in monitoring the progress of students' development in reading comprehension and Maths. At Paradise we are expanding the year levels tested to include year 1 and 2 also. By including the Early Years in these tests, the teacher is provided with another snap shot of data along with work produced during class. This is useful in setting directions for future learning but also in identifying any students that could benefit from early intervention.

Transitions with young children

Moving from one activity to the other can be challenging for young children of all ages, particularly if it is from a preferred activity to a non-preferred one – for example stop playing in room to come to dinner. Trying adding an element of play into these transitions to see if makes a positive impact.
